What's so great about Taste of Mississippi? A long-time volunteer Gretchen Cook, was asked this question. She responds in her own words:

The Beneficiaries. Stewpot is a multifaceted organization using many different methods to meet the needs of people in a wide variety of situations. When I see a cold or hungry person in need of a handout, there is really no way I can meet his or her needs. I am not a counselor, a tailor, dietician, hotelier, doctor, and career advisor or transportation service. I may be able to thrust a few dollars out a car window, but I am not able to make any real difference in this person's life. Stewpot

can and does make a tangible difference in countless lives every day. They do have staff and volunteers who are professionals, who know how to screen clients and best serve their needs. When we support Stewpot, we make available meaningful assistance, not just easy handouts.

The Volunteers. At Taste of Mississippi you will find an impressive cross section of Mississippi. All ages, incomes and walks of life are represented. At one recent meeting a member said to me, "We can't afford to support community organizations with money, so we give our time and energy." At the actual event, hundreds of hands come together to pull of a logistically complicated ballet. Tasks range from operating credit card machines to clean up. And all the volunteers give joyfully and enthusiastically, shoulder to shoulder. It's an image of reconciliation in action.

The Restaurants. If you're like us, you may have found your circle of restaurants narrowing as you fall into the habit of eating at your favorite places. After all, you know you'll like your entrée at your regular place; it's risky to invest a whole evening in something you may or may not enjoy. Taste of Mississippi is just that—a sampling of some of the state's finest restaurants. We enjoy the chance to see what other restaurants are all about, many times seeing the chefs in action. Awards are presented to winners for the best in each category-so restaurants aren't just serving, they competing. Which makes everything even better.

The Beverages. At the Taste of Mississippi Planning Committee meetings we've noticed an interesting phenomenon. It's easier to get major distributors to donate amazing varieties of wine and spirits than it is to locate bottled water. Why? Because the distributors are anxious to promote the newest offerings from their representative distilleries and vineyards. End result? Simply too many choices to make. It's probably impossible to sample everything... and very likely not even advisable.

The Music. Live music is a great enhancer of any occasion and the groups selected to play at *Taste of Mississippi* are no exception.

We don't get to hang out in places where there is live music very often-and Taste of *Mississippi* always reminds us of what we are missing.

The Silent Auction. It could be art from local and regional artists, to dining gift cards, to kitchen appliances and tools, to jewelry, to an endless array of tempting options. Selling prices are often well below market prices. It's a win-win situation for everyone
